Lessons From a Soap Maker

It was a beautiful day when a rabbi and a soap maker decided to go out for a stroll. They were both enjoying the warm weather when the soap maker abruptly turned to the rabbi and asked, "What good is religion? Religion teaches all these highfalutin'

morals and all these lofty values and ethics, yet look at this world!" Without giving the rabbi a chance to respond, the soap maker continued his rant: "The world is corrupt. It's filled with pain and evil and wickedness. So I ask you, Rabbi, what good is religion?"

Before the rabbi could answer, out of nowhere a huge rubber ball came flying through the air, headed right toward him. Fortunately the rabbi had quick reflexes. He caught the ball before it smacked him in the face! The rabbi returned the ball to the apologetic young boy who had come after it. As the boy ran off to join his friends, the rabbi said, "Just look at that young child. He's absolutely filthy! And you're a soap maker, so I ask you, what good is soap? There's all this soap in the world, and that young boy is still dirty!"

The soap maker protested. "How can you say that about soap? You're a learned man, Rabbi, so surely you understand that soap is good only if it's used."

"Aha," said the rabbi, with a slight grin. "And so it is with religion. We can teach it, and people can say they've learned it, but until they've used it and truly understand the meaning of its lessons, the power of its teachings, and the weightiness of its laws, then—and only then—can religion make a positive difference in the world."¹

Friends, we are entering the High Holy Day season. In other words, we're about to be face to face with intense Judaism for roughly a month. During this time, we might ask ourselves, "What is the point of all this?" or, "How am I supposed to get any meaning out of these services?" Perhaps some of us can answer these questions easily. I suspect,

however, that many of us struggle with religion in general (Judaism in particular) and especially the High Holy Days. It doesn't help that these *Yamim Noraim* (Days of Awe) only come around once a year. We tend to need constant repetition for anything to truly sink in.

The rabbi in this story makes a good point. For religion (or Judaism) to make a positive difference in the world, we need to peel away the many outside layers and expose the true beauty of our Tradition. We need to struggle with its concepts and learn its teachings so we can get the most out of our heritage. The same is true regarding the High Holy Days. Simply showing up, unfortunately, isn't going to do the trick. We need to push ourselves to uncover the beauty of this sacred time.

Perhaps all it takes is a little intention. Instead of entering the season as a passive participant, hoping for something to "click" inside us, we can begin by considering that the High Holy Days are about being part of a Jewish community and that together we celebrate how God has given us life and the opportunity to experience this world.

In his book, *Entering the High Holy Days*², Reuven Hammer writes, "Nothing is more precious than life, nothing as wondrous, and nothing as fragile. At this season especially, we are called upon to open our eyes and see the world, to feel that we are part of God's creative power. We are summoned to celebrate our lives and ask, 'What have we done to be worthy of this gift?'" And what a gift we've been given! Maybe for the High Holy Days to be a truly transformational experience, we ought to spend less time thinking about how we've missed the mark in various aspects of our lives (less, not zilch!) and more time focusing on the good we've done and plan to do. What *have* we done to be worthy of this gift? And *how* are we going to contribute to society once that last shofar blast has sounded? With a little intention and perhaps some studying up on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (see suggested reading list below), the High Holy Days will make a positive difference in each of us and in the world.

WELCOME BACK TO SCHOOL 2 RS News AND Notes

WELCOME BACK TO RELIGIOUS SCHOOL!

The <u>first day of class is Sunday September 9, and for the Hebrew classes</u>. <u>September 12</u>. We have lots of news for this school year! First of all, Sagit Hall continues in her role as Religious School Coordinator and is putting lots of time and energy into making the Religious School experience fun, interesting, and educational. Also, we have some new teachers this year: as of this writing, we welcome Rebecca LaMarsh (K/1 class), Lotem Raymond-Coe (grades 4 – 5), and Sarah Geliebter (grades 7 – 8). Rabbi Samuels will be teaching the 9th graders and b'nai mitzvah students. Older students who are interested in continuing their education should contact Sagit or Rabbi Samuels. We have a new group, the Gan Yeladim, for ages birth to 5 years, which will meet once a month, taught by Miriam Zderic – dates are on the website.

This year, we have been able to combine both sessions of Sunday classes into one session, which goes from <u>10 AM to 12 PM</u>. We are able to do this because our neighbors at Cedartree Montessori have agreed to rent us their space at a most affordable rate. The K/1, 2/3, and 4/5 classes will meet over there after *tefilah* and will come back over just before snack. We are excited about the later start time and the added convenience for families with kids in different classes. It also makes Religious School Committee meetings a lot easier to attend, and all parents are invited to participate. Coffee and bagels are planned! We are also providing the snack this year as part of tuition, thanks to McNeel Jantzen who has graciously offered to be our Snack Fairy! This makes life easier for our busy parents while allowing our kids that time to socialize and celebrate together.

Among the plans for the upcoming year are three *Shabbatonim*, three adult learning opportunities, an Earth Day Hike, as well as our traditional Hanukkah Party, Purim Carnival, Yard Sale, and End-of-Year Picnic. Consecration of new students is Monday October 8^{TH} at Simchat Torah evening service. The Religious School Committee will be involved in organizing and supporting these events as well as hosting the oneg after the family service at Rosh Hashanah, and the oneg after the Teacher Appreciation Shabbat service in the spring. RSC meetings are generally the first Sunday of the month during Religious School, and all parents and interested community members are encouraged to participate.
