# MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

Each election we always hear people say, "This is the most important election in our lifetime." Or, "Now more than ever, we need to get out the vote." And each time around these people are correct, as there is no time like the present. Each election is important, as there are always issues that

may affect us or our loved ones, positively or negatively depending on how you look at them. This year there happens to be one such issue that has received substantial press, airtime, and chatter over the Internet and blog-o-sphere. That's right - I'm talking about Washington State Referendum 74. Marriage equality is actually on three other ballots this month, in Maine, Maryland, and Minnesota. Washington could join 6 states that already have legalized same-sex marriage.

As you are aware, this is a divisive issue in our state and country. Americans are split on this issue and so are Jews. In fact, you can find Jewish textual support for either side. This is always the case. Judaism does not teach us that we must vote one way or the other: however, the Reform Movement (of which Beth Israel is a member) has taken a stance on the

matter, several times. I would like to share one such resolution with you in the event you are still undecided or are simply curious as to what the leaders of Reform Judaism say.

In 2004, the Central Conference of American Rabbis (the Rabbinic organization within the Union of Reform Judaism) adopted a resolution in support of marriage equality for all people, regardless of sexual orientation. Below is part of the text. The full resolution as well as other articles can be found on the Religious Action Center's website (www.rac.org). encourage you to surf this website.

The Reform Jewish Movement has long been committed to welcoming gay and lesbian Jews and their children into our synagogues and communal life. For too long, much of the world has treated them as 'strangers.' Our Scriptures teach us: 'You shall not oppress a stranger, for you know the feelings of a stranger, having yourselves been strangers in the land of Egypt.' (Exodus 23:9). The Central Conference of American Rabbis has thus consistently supported full equality for lesbians and gays in society, adopting resolutions in 1977 encouraging the decriminalization of same-sex

intimacy between consenting adults and prohibiting discrimination against gays and lesbians as persons, and in 1996 supporting the right of gay and lesbian couples to share fully and equally in the rights of civil marriage.

As rabbis, we believe it is our obligation as people of faith to defend vigorously the dignity of every human being, consistent with the principle that each of us is created in the Divine image. (Genesis 1:27). While we respect those who may be single, we uphold the values of marriage and family. Marriage, imbued with the values of exclusivity, permanence, intimate companionship, and love, provides fulfillment for each partner and adds to the common good of the community. We affirm that every human being has an absolute right to such fulfillment, and that the loving, committed relationships of same-sex couples have the same potential for holiness as those of heterosexual couples.

At the same time, we recognize that not all people of faith and not all clergy share our affirmation. We respect their right to hold opposing views. Still, we contend that the civil rights of some should not be denied because of the religious beliefs of others. Government should treat all people equally and fairly under the law.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Northeast Region of the Central Conference of American Rabbis applauds and supports the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court's ruling in *Goodridge v. Department of Public Health* -- that denying same-sex couples access to civil marriage violates the constitutional guarantees of liberty and equality -- as a step toward ensuring the right of gay and lesbian Americans to share in the joys, privileges, and responsibilities of marriage afforded in law to heterosexuals, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, as citizens, we call upon the legislators of all states to affirm civil marriage rights of every person regardless of sexual orientation, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we oppose legislative efforts to substitute a separate and lesser legal status, such as civil unions, for the full marriage equality same-sex couples deserve, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we unequivocally oppose attempts to amend the constitution of any state or the Constitution of the United States in order to discriminate against same-sex couples and their families.

I am proud to be a Reform rabbi, and especially a rabbi at Beth Israel – and I hope you feel proud to be part of the Reform Movement.

#### Interfaith Coalition Severe Weather Shelters

In anticipation of the colder days and nights ahead, Interfaith Coalition is gearing up to open its two severe weather shelters. The shelters, staffed by **volunteers** from 5 PM to 8 AM, open when temperatures or weather conditions may be life threatening to some homeless individuals. Interested individuals and couples may volunteer for one of three shifts, including an overnight shift, during which volunteers take turns sleeping. Only female volunteers staff the women's shelter, but women also may work at the men's shelter during the evening and morning shifts.

A training for new volunteers will be offered on **Thursday, Nov. 15 from 7—8:30 PM.** The trainings will be offered at the two shelter sites.
