MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

Going Green I bought a pair of shoes recently. They are dark brown loafers that will go well with jeans when I'm lounging around the house or doing errands on my day off. I have not felt this enthused about

buying shoes since my parents bought

me a pair of Nike "Air Jordans" in the mid 1980's! How are these shoes different from all other shoes? This pair happens to be vegan. That's right, 100% **vegan**. No animals or animal products were used in any part of their manufacturing. The soles are even made from recycled automobile tires.

It seems like the country today is more concerned about sustainability, waste reduction, ecologically intelligent designing, and going "green" than it ever was. After living here for almost 5 months, it appears that Bellingham takes this all very seriously. This is just one aspect that Nicole and I love about our new home town. (We finally have a compost bin!) In fact, evidence of this conscientiousness is built right into our new synagogue. Blasted rock from the site is being re-used to create the parking lots, roads into and around the structure and the building's back-fill. Those in charge of this massive project have even acquired excavated concrete from city projects that will be sent to our new home for similar uses. We might not have solar panels on the roof and walls made from recycled aluminum cans, but believe me, 751 San Juan Blvd is a "green" building in more ways than one.

In recent years, New York City decided to make the huge Christmas tree in Rockefeller Center "green." Instead of using incandescent bulbs, the tree will be lit with 30,000 multicolored energy-efficient light emitting diodes, or LEDs, which will cut the energy consumption by as much as a 2000 square foot house consumes in a month. The source of the light will come by way of solar panels situated atop a building in the Center. When the tree is brought down after the holidays, the wood will be used to build homes by Habitat for Humanity. I hope this

A Message from the President

On my first trip back to Israel in five years, I was thrilled to see all of the changes that had taken place. People in the service industry now know that "service" is not just a word. Roads are built to prevent accidents and are not just a place for Israelis to play "bumper cars". The country has lost a lot of the ancient feel, for both the good and the bad.

On my fourth morning I was made aware that one thing hadn't changed: the neighbors. Once again the early morning air was disturbed by incoming rocket fire. I knew I was in Israel. Over the next few days I visited long-lost friends and relatives in Be'er Sheva, Ashdod, and the area around Kiryat Malachi and Be'er Tuvya — all places that would become known in the world news in the coming weeks as destinations for rockets coming out of Gaza.

At this moment there is a cease fire in effect, with no clear victor; I can only hope that it will last for some time. Since Israel ran this operation in such a different manner than the last confrontation with Gaza, the world was not as against Israel. I can only hope that the world has come to learn who the real aggressor is, and no, it's not even the poor Hamas — they are small players in a big game.

mindset remains in vogue for a long time.

Our Jewish tradition would argue that this way of living is not new, but can be traced back all the way to biblical times. In Deuteronomy 20:19-20 we learn of the mitzvah called *bal tashchit*, or the commandment "not to destroy." In the context of the Torah, this mitzvah refers to the destruction of fruit-bearing trees during times of war. The rabbis have taken this lesson and expanded it to prohibit destroying anything of value wantonly. This would then refer to objects such as water sources, buildings, food sources, etc. If the destruction of the object is done to prohibit further damage to another person, then it is permitted. But if the destruction serves no other purpose than to destroy, or can be prevented, then the act violates the mitzvah.

We are all lucky to be alive in this beautiful world. And since we are, this then permits us to make use of the environment, as it is rich with resources. But we must also remember that the world does not belong to us. We are just tenants for a brief time. The mitzvah of *bal tashchit* reminds us of this and of just how fragile our home is. It also reminds us that we can make a difference through our actions. It's not too late to start. From changing light bulbs, eating local produce, insulating our homes with energy-efficient windows, recycling, composting, and cutting down on consuming animal products, we will not only fulfill this mitzvah, but during the Hanukkah season we will be giving our "Landlord" some of the best gifts available.


