## **Engaging Our** Seniors

Throughout our people's history, the synagogue has been the



center of Jewish life in nearly every community where there have been Jews. In most of these places, the synagogue has

served various roles as well. There is the beit tefillah, house of worship; the beit sefer, house of study; and the beit knesset, house of assembly. Beth Israel functions in this way as well, though, not entirely equally.

Much of what we do here is focused on our youth. I don't think there is anyone who would argue that instilling Jewish knowledge and pride in the hearts and minds of our youth is a bad thing. In fact, this might be the most important role we serve as a Jewish community. Our "health" depends on them. Luckily for us, we have an extraordinary Religious and Hebrew school, led by Sagit Hall, that has nearly doubled in size in the past two years. We just held an overnight Religious School family Shabbaton at Camp Kalsman that left each participant wanting



## Faces in our community

# Coming home after 40 years

Like the ancient Israelites, Gayle Gordon-Martin left Bellingham for a 40-year exodus. The difference was, Gayle returned -- to her native town and to her *shul*, Congregation Beth Israel.

Both Gayle and her husband Steve lived in Bremerton then moved to Indianapolis, Steve's hometown. In the interim, she left behind her observance of Judaism.

"I felt disconnected. I was in my own desert and had to find my way back," she said.

What brought her back was a tragic rash of deaths including brother Hank in 2011 and beloved mother and longtime Beth Israel member Rita Gordon in February 2013. Rabbi Cindy Enger helped her shape "a proper Kaddish," for Hank and Rabbi Joshua Samuels helped with the burial and the unveiling for Rita.

At first these services did not stem from spirituality. But holding books her family held and speaking words they spoke reconnected her to the synagogue where her father, Bill Gordon, was president in the early '70s.

"I went out of respect for my family and stayed out of love," she said.

Two months after Rita's funeral, Gayle and Steve joined CBI. Her *tshuvah* has forged such a powerful desire to learn that she studies Hebrew with Judy Soicher and recently lead Torah Study in

Rabbi Samuels' absence.

As a native, Gayle remembers Bellingham's slower pace. The synagogue though, she said, remained the same -- its distinctive scent, the sanctuary's upholstered benches and wallpaper that her mom and fellow congregant, Bonnie Stone approved "not to redecorate but to patch up."

For Steve, Bellingham "has the benefits of a big town with a small town feel." As for CBI, "We've met people we expect will be close friends for life," he said.

Gayle left town in 1977 to attend Washington State University in Pullman. She met Steve, a fellow housemate in

Bremerton where she worked as a parole officer for the Department of Corrections in 1984. He was a Sonar Chief in the US Navy stationed on board a nuclear submarine. Marrying in 1987, they moved to Indianapolis until the recession pushed them west again. While in Indiana they fostered more than 20 children of diverse races and faiths. One, Tammy, they adopted at age 18, to make family love permanent. Now 35, Tammy and her husband Chris have given the Martins a grandchild, Breanna, age

5, a CBI religious school student who helped bake matzoh at Passover.

Steve's mixed heritage stands in contrast with Gayle's background. His mother was a Roman Catholic, his father a southern Baptist minister. Each church wanted him, "so I chose not to set foot in either," he said. Now, stepping across CBI's threshold, he has found a "a warm and welcoming connection and a rekindled relationship with God."

to come back for more. (This will certainly be an annual event.) And as you will read more about in this issue, I had the honor of taking seven of our teens to Washington, D.C., in March, where they lobbied on Capitol Hill on contemporary issues that resonate with them in a deep and meaningful way. CBI as a *beit sefer* is running very well.

I wonder, however, if all of our energy going into fostering the next generation of Jewish leaders is neglecting those in our community who have already served as leaders in this or any other Jewish community. In other words, are we serving the needs of the empty-nester and elderly population as well as we are serving the needs of our youth? Is our beit knesset as strong as our beit sefer? My guess is that we would all answer "No."

Surprisingly (or not), most synagogue communities today heavily cater to their young families and youth, mainly for the reasons stated above, but also because it's hard enough attracting this population, let alone retaining them past their bar/bat mitzvah. Therefore much research and effort goes into figuring out ways to engage this demographic. On the other hand, those who have been in the Jewish community for many years are less likely to leave and thus, there are not nearly as many programs aimed at engaging this equally important group of people.

The Talmud singles out the elderly in our communities in a powerful way. In *Berachot* 8b, we read, "Show respect to an elderly man who has forgotten his learning through no fault of his own, for we have learned that the fragments of the old tablets [the Ten Commandments]

were kept alongside the new tablets in the Ark of the Covenant." What we learn from this passage is that just as the shattered remains of the "older" tablets were regarded as equally holy and treated with the same amount of respect as the newer version, so too must we show the same respect and veneration to our more learned and aged community members. They deserve nothing less.

The question remains: How do we do this? How should we be engaging this population in equally meaningful ways? How can Beth Israel also blossom into a thriving beit knesset? I now charge you with answering these questions. Send your ideas to me. Give me a call. Visit me! I am happy to buy you a cup of coffee and discuss how we can create an environment in which every member has a place to go on their Jewish journey. Let's start the conversation.


