'Mathematician's Shiva' program

Congregation Beth Israel, in conjunction with Village Books, is pleased to host a presentation and book signing by Stuart Rojstaczer, author of the newly released "The Mathematician's Shiva."


Publisher's Weekly described the book as "a convergence of high math, Eastern European history, and Ameri-



can culture." After Rachela Karnokovitch, a Polish émigré and university professor regarded as her generation's leading mathematician, dies from cancer in 2001, her middleaged son, Alexander, a

meteorologist also known as Sasha, is tasked with organizing the shiva. Dozens of his mother's colleagues descend, proving to be less interested in mourning Rachela than uncovering her secrets - particularly her rumored solution to one of math's most famous enigmas, the Navier-Stokes problem.

On his website (stuartr.com), Rojstaczer says of himself: "I'm overeducat-



ed and like to tell jokes.

"I was raised in Milwaukee (my parents were Polish-Jewish immigrants) and have lived in Italy, Israel and everywhere in America except the Northeast. I've been a Duke University professor and a restaurant dishwasher (one paid a lot better, the other might have been a bit more fun). ...

"Somehow along the way, I became America's grade inflation czar (I don't understand how this happened, honest)."

We are pleased we could arrange this presentation during Dr. Rojstaczer's West Coast book tour.

Faces in our community

Anne Brown: Hospitality incarnate

For many, Anne Brown stands as a metaphor for Congregation Beth Israel.

That's because she is often the first person from the synagoque that a new member meets.

Anne founded the membership committee around 1968 and chaired it for 20 years to ensure hospitality at Beth Israel. She has been a one-woman Welcome Wagon, bringing each new member gifts of Shabbat candles and challah.

"That's one way I got to know everyone," she said.

The ambiance she has helped create has inspired Frank Champagne. Back around 2003, he described the community in a classic statement:

"Whenever I go there," he said, "it's like stepping into a warm bath."

Anne believes that Beth Israel's current spiritual leader adds to the geniality. She showers Rabbi Joshua Samuels, with praise, saying that he responds to adults and is a magician with children.

After 52 years in Bellingham, Anne is leaving to live in the Summit, a Jewish retirement home in Seattle. There she will enjoy proximity to her children and members of her extended family.

But Anne will leave a legacy.

In addition to her accomplishments in the religious community, she has shone in civic affairs. Her memoir lists at least ten awards, among them a spot in the Northwest Woman's Hall of Fame for her achievements. Through her projects, she has accumulated multitudes of friends in both sectors.

Anne worked at the Whatcom County Health department as a public health nurse for 19 years. Because of her affection for children of nursery school age, they have served as a focus for much of her work and volunteerism. During her time with the health department, she helped develop the Whatcom Center for Early Learning.

After Anne's retirement, she poured her energy into Beth Israel.

One highlight in her tenure was the conversion of her husband Will, formerly a Unitarian. She remembered how he woke up one morning, after 50 years of marriage, and said, "I'm going to call the rabbi about converting." The rabbi, Yossi Leibowitz, was amazed when Will plowed through the book, Jewish Literacy by Joseph Telushkin practically overnight.

"Will was so active at Beth Israel that many people were surprised to learn he wasn't Jewish," Anne said.

Will and Anne met in Seattle. Anne moved there on March 15, 1948 and joined Hillel to meet other Jewish people her age. A Unitarian youth group had asked Hillel members to

every person to connect spiritually and intellectually to our rich tradition. As you might imagine, this is easier said than done. But thankfully, with your comments from the post-HHD survey last year, you have provided me with valuable input that has helped inform how this year's services will hopefully feel.

The biggest change is in regard to music and leadership. Many congregants commented that they prefer praying to familiar melodies with a balance between contemporary and traditional. In addition, a considerable number of people (not a majority) felt that the use of musical instruments on the bima last year was a bit excessive and did not allow for a prayerful experience. In fact it detracted from this goal. Finally, many congregants prefer being led by someone familiar with Beth Israel. In other words, when an "outsider" leads us, regardless of how well they are received, the service simply doesn't feel very Beth Israel-ish.

These concerns have been addressed. First and foremost in terms of cantorial leadership. We are blessed to welcome back to our community Andrea Shupack, along with her husband, Josh, and son, Aiden. As many of you know, Andrea grew up here (she is the daughter of member and former Board president David Cohn), was active in our PHAT youth group and taught in our Religious School. Andrea is not only an accomplished singer, teaching voice lessons and music classes for close to a decade, but she also has directed choirs and sung in various choral groups as well as with the Rogue Valley Opera and Southern Oregon Repertory Singers. Andrea has a passion for Jewish education as well. She

Finally, in place of the traditional text study on Yom Kippur afternoon, we will be engaging in a facilitated dialogue based on the topic of my Kol Nidre sermon. As we come together to usher in the New Year, I want to express my gratitude to each and every one of you for supporting Jewish life in Bellingham and for committing yourselves to the growth of our special community. It took a coincidence to ignite the relationship, though. Strolling in Lincoln Park one day, she saw Will walking with friends, towards her. That Hollywood-style scenario sealed it. He asked her out.

They married on March 21, 1949. While building a house in Seattle, they rented one with a row boat right on the water in Bainbridge Island. Will, a former Boeing engineer, taught high school.

Western Washington University asked him to be on a committee to evaluate student teachers in 1956, prompting a move to Bellingham.

Will then got a masters degree and left for Gainesville, Florida, so he could earn a doctorate in science education. After a teaching stint at San Francisco State, Will returned to Western Washington with tenure in 1966. Two years later, they bought a lot on Highland Drive and built the current house with a magnificent view overlooking the bay. Will died in 2003.

Anne and Will had two children, Debbie, who now lives in Seattle, and Rob, who makes his home in Kirkland. Most family members, except for two on the eastern seaboard, live nearby. Even they go west every year or so when matriarch Anne gathers the brood at her house with its remarkable multilevel garden.

Anne's memoir is titled My Life Has Been an Adventure. And it has.

She was born in Germany. With the Nazi threat looming, her parents arranged for her and her brother, Ernest, to board at English schools. She first set foot on American soil on April 16, 1939. She and her family have celebrated that date with an ice cream cone ever since. The family settled in New York City.

Since her graduation from nursing school -- she has two bachelor's of nursing degrees -- she has lived and worked as a nurse in many places. Among them, are Seattle, Ellensburg, San Francisco,

California, Gainesville, Florida and Boise, Idaho, where she worked for the Red Cross during a polio epidemic.

Anne has traveled back to Europe many times. She has visited her hometown, Schluchtern, as well. In 1998, the town's mayor invited former Jewish residents at the city's expense to celebrate the synagogue's 100th anniversary. Twenty five people and their families enjoyed a whirlwind reunion.

She expects her move to the Summit to contrast to her present life. One resident told her that "It's just like living on a cruise ship. Everything is done for you."

Summit holds services, but Anne will be back in Bellingham for the High Holy Days because she and her family have always held the town and the shul dear to their hearts.

"This is still home," she said. "It's just a comfortable place to be."


