





It all started when Andrea Shupack mentioned that there were some Hebrew School books that weren't being used and she wished they would find a worthy home. Then a Facebook message from Rabbi Nelly Altenburger of Congregation Adath Israel in Middletown, CT appeared requesting gently used Hebrew





school materials. She was inquiring on behalf of the Jewish community Nasenyi, in Uganda.

After being filled in on the details, Rabbi Samuels willingly donated money from the Rabbi's discretionary fund so that we could send the materials to Connecticut. The boxes remained there for months waiting for more funding for shipping out of the USA. Finally, our fifth- and sixth-grade teacher, Kevin Donner, worked with his class to help raise

I know you feel the same way, too. When the community shows up, there's a different energy in the room, the songs sound better, and our spirits are lifted.

In speaking with fellow local clergy and rabbinic colleagues, I've learned attendance is still down across the board. There are good reasons that some choose not to show up in person, and I am so grateful that we have been able to stay connected through Zoom. Years ago, I explained to the Board that we needed to embrace technology in the sanctuary. It finally took a pandemic to get us up to speed. But I also know that there are folks who have grown accustomed to praying and participating from the comfort of their living room couches. It's conven-

Compromise



As I am writing this, we have just finished the High Holy Days. I am exhausted, partly due to my recent Covid infection. I can't even imagine how spent Rabbi and Andrea feel after all their great lead-

ership work. It was a wonderful set of services that went off without a hitch. It was great to see so many people participating both in person and online. Thank you to all the volunteers who helped support us behind the scenes during this special time of the year. It can be hard to know how much time people donate to our synagogue. I have never found a way to keep track of it all. But I know we would not have had such successful events and services without these kind helpers.

You know that I love Jewish jokes, so I feel I should share this one about the High Holy Days:

A Jewish father calls his son in New York and tells him, "I hate to tell you, but your mother and I can't stand each other anymore and we are divorcing. That's it! I want to live out the rest of my years in peace. I am telling you now so you and your sister shouldn't go into shock later when I move out."

The father hangs up and his son immediately calls his sister and tells her the news. The sister says, "I'll handle this."

She calls her father in Florida. She pleads with her father, "Don't do ANYTHING until David and I get there! We will be there Friday night."

The father says, "All right, all right. I'll wait."

When the father hangs up the phone, he hollers to his wife, "They're coming for Rosh Hashanah."

Hopefully no one in our community had to resort to this level of trickery to get family together!

As many of you noticed, our policy for masking changed right before the High Holy Days. I know that decision did not please everyone. I have heard from some of you and appreciate your shared feelings. Please know that the Covid Task Force spent a lot of time debating

and discussing the options before making a proposal to the Board. We are so lucky to have a task force that is composed of doctors, nurses, safety professionals, and others. They carefully review the polices recommended by the CDC and the State of Washington, as well as the statistics from Whatcom and Skagit Counties' health departments, and the local hospitals.

At every meeting we have differing initial opinions, but after lengthy discussion we have been able to come up with a recommendation that everyone can agree to. There is always some compromise, and as you can imagine, this is a challenge. The Covid Task Force proposals are then discussed by the Board. And again, there are discussions and time spent understanding the reasoning behind the proposal.

The emotions around Covid and masks are deep and strong. Our safety and the types of precautions we are willing to take for each other can be heavy topics! So, while it may appear that this was a quick decision, I want to assure everyone that a lot of thought went into this and every mask policy we have had during this pandemic. It doesn't please everyone, and that was also considered when making the policy. It didn't please everyone on the task force either. It meant some would not attend services in person—even some of the Covid Task Force members.

These are the hard decisions a community needs to make, whether it is about when to wear masks or any of the other policies and decisions that have been passed by the Board over the last year. As President, I have learned so much from our committees, task forces and Board this last year. Although there are times I wish we could make quick decisions, I have learned the importance of our long discussions and how they can help find compromise. Compromising is no small task. I want to thank all those people on committees, the Board, and our community.

I am proud to be a part of such an amazing group of people and honored to be President. I hope you all have a wonderful year ahead.



money during their class-led family service. That money went directly toward sending the materials from CT to Uganda.

Recently we received pictures of the Nasenyi Jewish School students enjoying Hebrew language workbooks, sharing Jewish ceremonial items, and reading Jewish story books. This mitzvah would not have been possible if not for the united effort by our very own Kesher community. Our work is not done and the rabbi has agreed to support the next shipment to the community soon. Stay tuned.

Our MASSA Israel Studies pilot program currently has twenty-three enrolled students; fifteen are from CBI and eight in Temple Beth Or from Everett. The first day of MASSA class was on September 18. TBO joined us for our "Gear UP" presentation and Kesher's open house. Our Everett guests mentioned how very welcomed they felt by our Kesher team and CBI members! A special thanks to everyone who made the effort to reach out to our new friends.

MASSA classes will continue to be held once a month for the next two years with students earning the opportunity to travel to Israel with their teacher, Gaby Mayers, and Rabbi



Samuels in the summer of 2024. After their trip, students will resume meeting in order to reflect on their traveling experiences and assist in recruiting future potential MASSA candidates. It is our intention to continue this program for Kesher students.

Please consider supporting the various fundraisers MASSA will be conducting over the next few years. They are working toward earning their tickets. Perhaps people might

think about hiring our youth for odd jobs like house cleaning, yard work, or babysitting; people might even contemplate making a donation to the Israel Trip Scholarship Fund. Successful Food Drive and Welcoming Refugees!

The High Holy Days food drive was very successful. Thanks to all the congregants who donated to the Foothills Food Bank in Kendall, WA. The amount of food donated was the most we have ever collected. Three pallets of food were donated with an additional \$361.00 dollars. The executive director, Sam Norris, was very grateful for the donations as winter approaches. Our donations will go toward their "Happy Pantry" which are shelves provided outside the door of the Food Bank and give the community nonperishables 24/7. Monetary donations can still be made to their website at foothillsfoodbank.org. You can also link your Fred Meyer Community Rewards Card to the Foothills Food Bank, and a percentage of your purchases will be donated to them.

The Social Action Committee is now sponsoring an apartment setup for refugees in association with the Refugee Resettlement project of Jewish Family Services in Seattle. JFS is assigned refugee resettlement clients by the U.S. State Department and HIAS (formerly the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society). In recent years, resettlement clients have primarily come from Bhutan, Burma, East Africa, Iraq, Iran, and the former Soviet Union. JFS has been assigned a few refugees from the Syrian and the Ukrainian conflicts.

There will be a list of needed items in a shared link in the upcoming Timbrel. The list is also posted in the synagogue. CBI will collect these items through December 2022 in the donation baskets at the back of the social hall. If you are not coming into the synagogue at this time, please contact Linda Blackwell (360-739-1492) for pick-up of your donations. You can also review the JFSSeattle website or contact volunteer@jfsseattle.org for more detail or for monetary donations.





To sponsor an apartment set-up, we will procure all of the essential household items needed to welcome newly arrived refugees into their homes. Items include: pots and pans, utensils, bedding, and hygiene items. We ask that these items be new for the health and safety of the new clients. Younger children can make "welcome cards"; letters or cards with positive, warm messages are appreciated. These will be left for families once an apartment is set up.

At present we will NOT be collecting food for DVSAS Thanksgiving. Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Services request that we make donation on their website at DVSAS.org. You can also mail a check to DVSAS of Whatcom County, 1407 Commercial Street, Bellingham WA 98225.

Brand New Opportunities To Support CBI

Flowing from a recent strategic Board review of CBI finances, several needs were identified which led to the development of two new gifting opportunities to complement the array of specific-purpose funds already in existence (Building Fund, Library Fund, Kesher Scholarships, etc.).

The **Rabbi's Circle** was created to assure adequate staffing and robust social and cultural programming to keep pace with our growing congregation. Currently CBI staff is the same as it was 20 years ago when we had half of today's membership and only a fifth of the building size to maintain!

Programming is now re-energized by an active committee, but constrained by budget limits. Both the need for additional staff (administrative and eventually maintenance) and expanded programming could be addressed with extra donations. The Rabbi's Circle is aimed at households that are already contributing the target annual amount or more and would like to offer further support to help realize these particular goals. Suggested giving levels are \$1,800+, \$3,600+, and \$7,200+ per year. Participants will receive periodic briefings from the Rabbi and/or Board President, invitations to exclusive social events with the Rabbi, and, with consent, recognition on the CBI website as Rabbi's Circle supporters.

The CBI Board has also approved the formation of an **Endowment Fund** with an eye to longer-term financial stability. All donations to the CBI Endowment Fund will be invested in perpetuity (not spent), monitored, and managed by the Endowment Committee. Over time, the income

generated may be spent on operations or capital projects as outlined in the Endowment Policy and subject to Board oversight. Gifts to the Endowment Fund can be made during one's lifetime or as a bequest (at death), usually indicated in a Will or trust.

Of course, we are deeply grateful for the amazing generosity of our CBI community in the annual pledges and Kesher tuition payments, which cover the majority of our operational budget. We are also thankful for the ongoing donations to the Building Fund which have made possible our debt-free, wonderful new synagogue campus. And we are excited to launch these new ways to support the expanding CBI community. How To Donate to CBI:

Most members contribute by cash or credit card, so they may not be aware of several other ways to make donations. And, of note, some of those alternate options may also provide significant tax savings to the donor. So, to clarify, here are the various donation methods:

- 1. Cash, checks, or direct bank debit by the synagogue office.
- Charge a credit card (please note that paying by credit card costs CBI approx. 3% of the amount charged so all are encouraged to add extra to the donation to cover the credit card bank fee).
- 3. Direct a Donor Advised Fund to send a check payable to CBI.*
- Transfer shares of highly appreciated stock or mutual funds to CBI's Schwab Account.*
- 5. For individuals over age 70 ½ request a Qualified Charitable Distribution directly from your IRA.*

6. Name CBI as a beneficiary in your Will, trust, IRA or insurance policy.*

All of these options work for potentially taxdeductible donations such as membership commitments, general or targeted donations and New Synagogue contributions. However, purchases such as Kesher tuition, tickets to events, or prayer books need to be paid by cash, bank debit or credit cards because they are technically not "donations" but rather "payments for value received."

Hopefully, this list offers ideas to make supporting CBI easier and perhaps more tax-efficient. Your contributions mean a lot to CBI no matter how you choose to do them!

Faces in Our Community: James Finley and John Sternlicht

Shout many Mazel
Tovs for James Finley
and John Sternlicht!
In June 2010, they
married at Georgetown
University in a small
outdoor ceremony.

Three days later, they said their vows illegally at Congregation Beth Ahabah in Richmond, VA. Remember: Marriage for same sex couples was legalized on June 26, 2015—five years later.

"We were the first gay wedding performed at our synagogue," James said.

And 350 family members and friends were there to cheer them on. "It was an enormous, very welcoming, excited crowd, an amazing experience," John said.

Member Josh Greenberg knows why. "I personally really cherish how they are both so warm and welcoming every time I see them. They are the type of couple you always look forward to seeing again," Josh said.

There's more. At the wedding, Carlton, James's son, met assistant volleyball coach Yue Liu, and they married two years later on a beach in the Outer Banks, NC. That was equaled only by the marriage of John's son David to Naama in the same synagogue in 2016. Now the husbands have another generation with whom to ply their love: fivemonth-old granddaughter Mia Adele, David and Naama's daughter.

"It's unique being gay grandpas," said John, who has another son, Jeremy. And "we're both anomalies if you consider where we grew up"—he in Fayetteville, NC, and James in Hereford, TX.

Texas? North Carolina? Both below the Mason Dixon line? Both have something to say about it. James went to school in Midland, TX, "where a conservative, Christian, racist faction worked together affecting what people think, say, follow, and expect from each other." As for John, "Growing up in NC was a very interesting and isolating experience. There was a heavy layer of racism

and white Christian supremacy there...and I felt like an oddity."

Raised Christian, James converted to Judaism as an adult. "As a gay man, I believe Judaism has an expectation of standing up for the underdog, the less fortunate, and anyone being discriminated against."

James got a degree in range management at Sul Ross State University, then a Master's in management and leadership from Western Governors University. "Learning and teaching youth drove my career as an educator, coach, and advisor," he said. "This has kept me hungry to learn,

ient, especially on a Friday evening after a long day at work or on a Saturday morning when we just want a few more Z's. Plus, there are still concerns about catching Covid-19.

I understand all these reasons for staying home. But I really want to see your faces and hear your voices in person. Even though I welcome virtual attendance, I know that those who participate that way experience services and events differently. Additionally, if most of the attendees are home, then those who do come to the synagogue are not able to engage with as many people as possible. We have so many new members, and I would love for them to get to know our community.

My colleagues Rabbi Josh Brown and Rabbi Danny Burkeman recently wrote an article addressing this issue. They wrote, "Knowing each other well and caring for each other happens best when we are 'back in the building' together, and back 'in person' in each other's lives."

It's true. We form connections when we are in each other's presence. But showing up in person is not just about fostering relationships. We show up to support one another and celebrate simchas. When people have lost a loved one and come to say *kaddish*, it's important they feel the presence of community. And when families celebrate their child becoming a *b'nei mitzvah*, they want to see a packed sanctuary. (Our *b'nei mitzvah* services are open to the whole Beth Israel community. They

aren't invitation only affairs.) And lastly, studying with friends in person is much more engaging than doing it hybrid-style. I am hopeful that the *beit midrash* will once again be filled with learners for Torah study and other adult education classes.

I am eager to see you back in our beautiful building for singing, learning, celebrating, and socializing. Consider sponsoring an *oneg* with a group of friends. Invite your peers to join you when you feel the urge to be at CBI. If you prefer to stay home, invite friends to watch services together or to participate in Torah study with you. Spread the word that we are *open for business!* This sacred space isn't the same without you.

improve, and find ways I can help prepare them for their future." When James worked as a community college and college coach, he gained a business sense. He then owned a health club and owned and ran volleyball camps. He now teaches seventh-grade math at Anacortes Middle School, and works as assistant volleyball coach at the high school.

James and John met in Richmond, VA, online and by phone before meeting in person. Then "we dated for a year and a half before I asked John to marry me," James said.

"Early on, my ex-wife invited James to my birthday dinner, and the next night our rabbi invited him to my son Jeremy's Bar Mitzvah. That solidified our relationship," John said.

John's family had lived in New York City for generations, but his parents moved to Rhode Island, then Fayetteville, NC.

"My parents had decided when I was very little that I was going to be a lawyer, and sure enough it happened," John said. He earned a law degree at University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, but soon became more involved in economic and community development. "I didn't see a rewarding future [psychologically speaking]" working for a law firm, he said.

John's parents were Reform Jews, but in North Carolina they attended a Conservative synagogue (the only option). Then he joined a congregation led by Reconstructionist Rabbi Steven Sager, a significant religious influence. When the rabbi was on sabbatical, John read Torah and chanted *Haftarot*. By then, John had learned French and Spanish, he relearned Hebrew, landing in Israel on his twenty-first birthday. He also learned German so he could study the Shoah in the original language.

Moving to Richmond, VA, he worked for Virginia's Attorney General, then for the Virginia Economic Develop-

ment Partnership as General Counsel. He served in Governor Mark Warner's cabinet as Deputy Secretary of Commerce and Trade, and then worked for SRI International (formerly Stanford Research Institute—developer of Siri) starting new bioscience facilities there.

After Richmond, they moved to Seattle in June 2013, then settled in Anacortes in 2015, shortly after John started as CEO of the Economic Development Alliance of Skagit County. "It has been extraordinarily rewarding to modernize and redirect that organization to a very effective community asset," he said.

"After moving to Anacortes, we joined CBI in 2016. It's a 45-minute drive, but worth it. Still, we haven't attended as often as we'd like. We have celebrated some holidays with the Skagit Jews, which is a lot of fun, and have a Skagit *chavurah*," James said. John agreed. "We have enjoyed particularly our times with the Skagit Jews—the local part of CBI," he said.

Josh Greenberg said that "John and James have quickly become one of our foundational Jewish families in the Skagit Valley. They have been helping host a *chavurah* discussion group and rarely miss one of our Jewish holiday get-togethers. Of particular note is the amazing cake that John bakes. We all call it Crack Cake because you can't stop eating it and always want more."

For fun, John said, he is involved in civil rights organizations, is on both the Anacortes Arts Festival and the Skagit Valley College foundation board of directors. He enjoys working out, practicing Brazilian Jiu Jitsu, biking, kayaking, and hiking. "We both enjoy entertaining and socializing with our amazing friends," he said. "And we both enjoy cooking and baking. It's nurturing the body, the soul, and our relationships."

As for travel, they have explored Israel, Europe, Scotland, and Ireland, "and we have emotional ties to Israel and my ancestry in Scotland," James said.
