# The Day Is Short and the Work Is Plentiful: Restarting CBI's Social Action Committee

On Sunday evening, June 8, a group of Beth Israel members gathered on Zoom to kick off the process of reviving CBI's Social Action Committee. David Schlitt and Alisa Sachs facilitated the meeting and were assisted in planning and outreach by former committee chair Linda Blackwell. Attendees were asked to briefly share what brought them to the meeting and, for many, the answer was that social justice and repairing the world — tikkun olam were central to their practice of Judaism. People described feeling hungry to find opportunities for activism within a Jewish context during a challenging time. After

Just a few weeks ago, I had the great pleasure of emceeing our annual Tikkun Leil Shavuot — a joyful evening of Torah

learning and community connection. The tradition of staying up late (or all night!) to study Torah on Shavuot originates in the Zohar, the central text of Jewish mysticism. There, it describes how, generations ago, Jews would spend the night before Shavuot immersed in sacred study, spiritually preparing themselves to receive Torah anew — just as our ancestors did at Sinai. On Shavuot, we don't simply remember the giving of Torah, we re-experience it. We open our hearts to revelation and renew our commitment to learning.

This year, nine congregants each offered a ten-minute teaching on a Jewish topic that spoke to them. I shared about the fascinating world of American Jewish gangsters in the early twentieth century. Professor Sarah Zarrow explored surprising connections between Jews and kefir.

Cantor Sharona Feller delighted us with lesser-known Shavuot customs and foods. Cherryne Kravitz

# **Kesher Updates**

May 18 was Mitzvah Day at Kesher, and it was a huge success. All our students took part in different projects designed to make the world a better place. Gan-K-first prepared homemade cookies and decorated gift bags, while some of our seventh graders wrote lovely greeting cards for our Care Committee recipients. Twelve bags were personally delivered by Kesher families and staff to their homes. Our elders expressed sincere appreciation and responded by thanking the kids for their efforts.

Meanwhile, the second/third and sixth graders decorated stones that are intended to beautify CBI's campus gardens. Our fourth graders worked directly with volunteer Miriam Schwartz. She demonstrated techniques for cleaning flower beds and monitored the weeding around the parking lot. Then our fifth graders took it upon themselves to find appropriate reading materials for younger readers, and they replaced the books from the shelves in the social hall library. After finishing that task, they promptly assembled 20 hygiene baggies for the Northwest Youth Services. Finally, our seventh graders assembled 20 additional hygiene bags for our homeless community. Kesher families took those bags to pass out when they came across a person in need. The kids all took their assignments seriously, and the day was a real success. See photos on page 9.

Our Kesher leadership team has determined that the volunteer reading program has been successful, and we will continue the program next year. If you think you might like to read preselected books to our Kesher students, watch for our SignUpGenius with availability and dates. This is a highlight for students and teachers who depend on community volunteers to fill in for their regular library times.

Kesher's admin team is already starting to plan for next year's teacher orientation and staff development

days. Part of our training will include a presentation by Safety and Security Committee leaders Dan Ohms and Tammy Dixon. They will discuss the new security action plan pamphlets that will soon be placed in every room at CBI. Plus, we will offer another CPR training class for Kesher staff and any CBI members needing their First Aid cards updated. If you know you will be needing a renewed First Aid card or CPR card, consider joining our CBI class. More updates will be available later.

Finally, it has become apparent that Kesher needs more parent support. Recruiting families to become more engaged will be a major priority next year. We will be requiring parents to select various volunteering opportunities from a checklist on the Kesher registration webpage. In addition, Kesher will be reinstalling the classroom lead parent system. Each grade will now have a lead parent who oversees making sure families are prepared for hosting their annual Family Shabbat oneg. Parent-class leaders will work in collaboration with the co-directors to assure that each Kesher-led Family Service has adequate support providing pescatarianfriendly potluck items for the oneg, setting up tables, clearing up after the meal, and cleaning the CBI kitchen. Interested parents will be able to notify the Kesher admin team on the online Kesher registration form. Classroom parents and parent volunteers are a critical component to the operations of our Jewish educational program. We need your help to make our school not only successful but to guarantee that we operate at our fullest potential. Thank you for your support and response to this call for action.

# "My Jewish Journey" Anthology

Storytelling by Beth Israel congregants has been happening for ten years at the annual Beit Café — successfully, we might add! The last two years, we proposed a theme of My Jewish Journey, which proved to be fruitful, educating, and entertaining. So many wonderful stories emerged, and the evening brought people together in a special way.

The idea of publishing an anthology of our stories surfaced after the last Beit Cafe. We are inviting everyone in the congregation to participate by sending us a story to include in the anthology we are calling MY JEWISH JOURNEY, a theme that can have many interpretations.

We have begun to get submissions and hope for many more.

Be broad in your imagination and interpretation of the theme. While family histories have an important role to play, we are looking for more personal to you interpretations than simply charting factual history.

Since we want to include everyone, we are thinking of a youth section, so encourage your teenagers to write a

story — how becoming a B'nei Mitzvah made them think about being Jewish, for instance. Younger children might also have a story to tell or a picture to offer — maybe something they have talked about at Kesher. We can include those in our children's chapter.

We are also hoping that the artists in our congregation will join by illustrating the stories once we have the roster.

Aim for between 600 and 1500 words, or 3-12 pages, double spaced. Please give your story a title.

We want to include every story. We might lend an editing hand to whatever you send us and will work collaboratively with you.

We know this will take time to assemble — it might take as long as a year to the finished product. The dead-line to send us your story is October 1.

led a grounding and beautiful guided Jewish meditation. Andrea Shupack sang original songs inspired by women in the Bible. Litav Langley reflected on sacred Jewish relationships.

Stu Berman — as always — shared a story that was both touching and humorous. Daniel Picus unpacked the deep meaning behind the Hebrew word for "soul." And Miriam Buckman offered a thoughtful teaching on the concept of peace.

It was a tremendously enriching evening — learning *lishma*, for its own sake.

At one point during the evening, I paused and thought how lucky we are to have this. Our community, and the Jewish people more broadly, cherish learning — not as a burden, but as a joy and a spiritual calling.

The centrality of learning in Jewish life dates all the way back to the Torah. The Shema commands us: *"Veshinantam levanecha"* — "You shall teach these words to your children" (Deuteronomy 6:7). The Torah isn't just a sacred book — it's a sacred process: a living, breathing tradition of study, questioning, arguing, and reinterpreting.

In Judaism, learning is itself a form of divine service. The Talmud even teaches *Talmud Torah k'neged kulam* — "The study of Torah is equal to all other *mitzvot*" (*Mishnah Peah* 1:1). That's a bold statement. It reminds us that learning isn't just a means to something holy — learning *is* the holy thing.

As we enter the summer months and think about how to spend our time, I encourage you to include some Jewish learning. Explore a book about our sacred texts. Browse Sefaria.org and dive into one of their many text studies. Meet a friend for coffee and discuss a Jewish thinker like Heschel, Buber, or Hartman. Or pick a moment in Jewish history to explore and share what you learn with someone else.

Be consistent. Be curious. And most of all, enjoy the journey.

If you'd like suggestions for texts, books, or topics, I'd love to help.

# The Courage of Many Beginnings: Dana and Luke Goodwin

Dana Zemel and Luke Goodwin met in New York by chance. Dana moved into the building in Brooklyn where Luke was living, and it was love at first sight.

Dana, who was born in Chicago but grew up in Bellingham, had gone to New York looking for interesting work after earning a BA in Human Geography from the University of Washington and an MA in Gastronomy from the University of Gastronomic Sciences in Italy. Luke was born and raised in Gainesville, FL and was working as a school counselor in New York.

I could write that they married and lived happily ever after — with sons Levi, 9, and Herschel, 7 — but such a summary scarcely begins to reveal their many creative interests, their many changes of direction, and their remarkable families.

Dana's father, Stuart, grew up in Chicago, and was a trader on its famous Commodity Exchange, but when Dana was still a child, he and her mother, Cinda, began to look for a way of life and a community better aligned with their values. Stuart's cousin and CBI member Henry Zemel recommended Bellingham. Driving up Chuckanut from Bow, they fell in love with the area. In a way, Dana repeated this trajectory by leaving lucrative HR work with large corporations in the East in favor of starting her own business working with small, local companies in Bellingham.

Luke's grandfather, a jeweler, was an immigrant who moved from Winston Salem, NC to Orlando where he started a department store and was a founding member of a synagogue. Luke, who was close to his grandfather, learned a lot about Judaism from him. Luke's father married a Catholic and chose to use her family name in a time when it was easier to move in the business world with a neutral name.

Luke was drawn to New York for college, where he earned a BA in Liberal Arts, followed by an MA in Philosophy and Religion, and a further MA in Mental Health Counseling from NYU.

His work as a counselor led him to study for a PhD in Clinical Psychology at Pittsburgh's Duquesne University. (He says he has been in school all his life.) By then, the young couple were parents, and Dana had to find new

work and child care first in Pittsburgh, and then again in Charlotte, NC, where Luke had his residency.

Luke's doctoral research was a study of Black men's experience of encounters with the police. He found that Black men don't simply react to that encounter in isolation, but in connection with all their other experiences and problems as Black people in this country. He puts great emphasis on experience as the subject of his research — not simply emotions or thoughts but the whole living mesh — what it's like when you're in the middle of it. He created the term "experientially excessive" to describe what happens when the experience you're having isn't isolated from certain other experiences you've had. Luke's concern with this deep level of understanding also informs his family life and his encounters with other people.

Dana's interest in food would seem to belong to a totally different path than Luke's, but actually their strengths converge. A course in college piqued her interest in gastronomy, and in graduate school she specialized

# Scrip — Try It — Especially If You Don't Carry Cash Any More!

If you're like most of us, you barely have to carry cash any more...you probably transact business on your phone or with a card. Beth Israel is right here with you at the forefront of technology with the Scrip program. It is also our longest-running fund raiser — so thank you!

The best thing about the Scrip program is that it costs the user nothing, while the Synagogue benefits! When you buy a gift card through the program, 4-5% of your purchase comes directly to Beth Israel. So if you buy a \$200 card every month, as I do, \$10.00 gets deposited to our account; that's \$120 a year. Remember the great song from *The Pajama Game* in which workers want a modest raise — "Seven and Half Cents" doesn't mean a heckuva lot...until you add it up? This is a great example...imagine 100 people times \$120/year...now we're talking about real money!

Joan Wayne runs this program for us. You probably already shop at one of the places she makes available. The most popular cards are Haggen/Safeway, Fred Meyer, The Food Co-op, and Starbucks.

If you've never tried it – why not now! If you support requests for help through our Meal Train, this would be a great way to increase the impact of your gift. Some gift cards are also available — Gift cards to Lands End, for instance land a whopping 17% profit to CBI!

It's easy to pay for the cards, too, with a check, credit card, or Zelle.

And then, when you've used up your card, bring it to the synagogue and drop it in the recycle container.

this, David shared a word of Torah from Rabbi Yitz Greenberg, as a way of grounding our discussion and setting an intention for the work of the committee in the year ahead. According to Rabbi Greenberg, the Talmud understands the concept of *b'tselem Elokim* (creation in the Divine image) as meaning that every human being is born with "three fundamental dignities": infinite value, equality, and uniqueness.

The new Social Action Committee will continue the work of previous iterations of the committee (with gratitude to committee founders and leaders Debbie Raas [*z*"*I*] and Linda Hirsh), supporting ongoing projects such as Mitzvah Day and the High Holy Days food drive. In addition, we are proposing a theme for 2025-2026 around which to focus our efforts: immigrant support.

As Jews, we bear a particular obligation toward our immigrant neighbors, as it is written in Exodus 23:9: "You shall not oppress a stranger, for you know the feelings of the stranger, having yourselves been strangers in the land of Egypt." We invited Sharon Camblin, coordinator of Whatcom Faith Community Immigrant Support (WFCIS), to speak at our kick-off meeting, to share more about the work that WFCIS is doing to assist local families impacted by raids and deportations. This past spring WFCIS set up an emergency pantry that safely distributes fresh food and supplies (such as diapers and art supplies) to vulnerable families. Sharon provided updates on their work so far and described where they hope to go from here, transitioning from an emergency response to a more permanent operation. This excerpt from a recent WFCIS newsletter gives a good sense of the values compelling them — and us — to action:

We are learning from families the number of men from the Mt. Baker Roofing ICE raid that have been deported already. More men have court dates in the next week. The challenges for those left behind and dealing with family separation are huge. Please keep in your prayers the people WFCIS is serving:

- The single father with an eight-year-old who smiles when there are yogurt cups as a nighttime snack,
- The family member who arrived in Mexico with none of their personal belongings including their phone and money,
- The young mother with an infant and a three-year-old who has been asked to leave her rental home even before her husband's hearing,
- The grandmother who has had two sons deported and seeks help for her daughter-in-law's and grandchildren,
- AND all those living in fear anywhere in Whatcom County.

Over the summer, members of the proposed Social Action Committee will be planning for the year ahead, revising our charter and mission statement, and preparing to go before the Board of Directors to seek approval for the revived committee and its acting leadership. Interested in getting involved and helping to shape the new Social Action Committee — or just want to stay in the loop to learn about *tikkun olam* opportunities? It's not too late to reach out! There are ways to get involved at whatever level of commitment you have time for. "The day is short, and the work is plentiful," as it says in *Pirkei Avot*. "It is not your duty to finish the work, but neither are you free to desist from it."

In true family fashion, Levi and Herschel have taken their various new beginnings in stride, now enjoying Lowell School and Kesher. Both are very social and have made many friends. Levi loves drawing and Legos, while Herschel loves soccer and Legos, and is "the family comedian."

Dana and Luke are grateful for the warm welcome they've received at CBI, renewing their connection to Judaism, with its emphasis on history and ties to the past. Many changes of direction have made the family strong and resilient. Now they are prepared and pleased to put down roots that will last.
